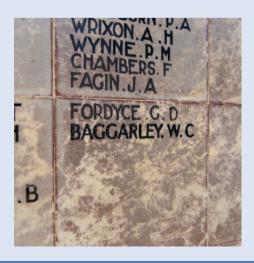
Soldier's service marked a century on

A desire to "put the record straight" has led to the name of a soldier killed at Gallipoli during World War One being added to the Kew War Memorial 108 years after his death.

Private William Charles Baggarley migrated to Australia from England in 1914, staying with relatives in Edgevale Road, Kew before enlisting in the Australian Army. He was killed in action on 7 August 1915, aged 21, within days of landing on the Gallipoli peninsula.

His relative Robert Blair was raised in the same Kew family home Private Baggarley departed from on his way to war. In his younger days Robert attended Anzac Day services at the Kew War Memorial, and later wondered why Private Baggarley's name was not recorded there.

He approached Council which worked with RSL Victoria and Heritage Victoria – the latter provided a permit exemption to add Private Baggarley's name to the memorial, and it was installed in May.





30 years of care for 'the small stuff'

When Studley Ward resident Bob Karolos found himself with an excess of fresh vegetables earlier this year, a chance conversation with Cr Nick Stavrou while walking their dogs meant the produce made its way into the pantries of vulnerable locals within days.

Cr Nick Stavrou put the resident in touch with Natalie Dixon-Monu (pictured above) who leads Boroondara Community Outreach (BCO), a Kew-based mental health ministry established in 1993 by the Uniting Church.

It offers those who are struggling crisis support, food relief and group activities, along with advocacy, health and legal referrals, disability support applications, and what Natalie calls "the small stuff".

"They're having trouble using their phone. Sewing a button back on... It's about the hugs because you've had bad news, because your mum died. Or someone who is coming up to the anniversary of her son's death.

"We give people somewhere to land where they feel like they're being held and they're no longer alone."

During the pandemic, BCO began offering cooked meals as an emergency food relief service. This has continued, but at a lower level, with an average of 450 meals each week. However, demand for all their services has been growing, with roughly 6 new people coming in every week since February.

When asked how locals can help, Natalie says new volunteers are always welcome, as are monetary donations via the website, and donations of all types of packaged food (unopened), and fresh produce.

"We're more than happy for people and local businesses to reach out, even if it's once-off to donate items or to come and help cook meals for a day."

Planting trees to reduce our emissions

We planted around 2,000 new trees in Boroondara in the 2022-23 financial year. This included the 1,000 trees we commit to planting every year, as well as an additional 1,000 trees we promised to plant in the last financial year as an action of our Climate Action Plan.

Here in Studley Ward, this included around 240 new trees.

Young trees, whether planted on your nature strip by Council, or in your own backyard, will always benefit from a little extra attention.

Water it: We water new trees planted in public spaces to help them get established in their new home. To check whether your new trees need watering, feel the soil just below the layer of mulch – if the soil is dry, the tree should be watered.

Mind the bark: When mowing and using line trimmers, avoid contact with a tree's bark. Bark helps protect trees

from pests and diseases, and damaging it can cause serious harm, especially to young trees.

Give it space: Avoid parking cars too close to a tree or storing heavy machinery or materials beneath the canopy to ensure the soil doesn't compact and oxygen can reach the roots. For young trees, try to leave 2 metres of clear space around them.

Winter wanders in Studley Ward

If you're in need of some fresh winter's air, why not enjoy one of our wonderful walks, parks or riding paths here in Studley Ward?

For the adventurous, take a stroll or a spin along the bushland walking trail on the Yarra River. Bellbird Park – with lovely views of the city – is a great spot for a winter picnic when the weather allows.

Alexandra Gardens are magnificent, Edwardian-style gardens just a short distance from Kew Junction shopping centre. Expansive lawn areas are surrounded by beautiful avenues of mature trees, while deep foliage and shrub borders offer splashes of seasonal colour. The park has accessible paths, electric barbecues, seating, and a public toilet at adjacent Kew Library.

You could also venture to dog and family-friendly Victoria Park (pictured below). With new adventure-filled playground facilities – including built-in trampolines and a bamboo forest, a 'learn to scoot, skate and ride' track, accessible paths and a dedicated exercise park for seniors – there's something here for everyone. It also has public toilets.
