3. **Presentation of officer reports**

3.1 Draft Boroondara Reconciliation Strategy 2022-26

At the Council meeting on Monday 26 April 2021, Council resolved a draft Boroondara Reconciliation Strategy (the draft Strategy) be presented to Council in late 2021 for consideration.

The purpose of this report is to seek the Services Delegated Committee's endorsement of the draft Boroondara Reconciliation Strategy 2022-26 (**Attachment 1**) for public exhibition between 16 November and 14 December 2021. The report also presents for the Services Delegated Committee's information the key-high level findings from the community consultations, which informed the development of the draft Strategy (**Attachment 2**).

The draft Strategy formalises Council's commitment to reconciliation by providing Council with a four-year vision for reconciliation in the municipality. It sets out a clear roadmap and framework for implementing reconciliation initiatives in the community in collaboration with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, service providers, community organisations and the broader community.

The draft Strategy was developed based on background research and extensive community consultations with key stakeholders from the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander sector, service providers, community organisations and the broader Boroondara community.

To provide advice on the development of the draft Strategy and to assist with facilitating the community consultations, Council engaged a consultant, Karen Milward, who is a Yorta Yorta woman and well respected in the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

To ensure the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices were heard and respected and the diverse issues and priorities were understood, acknowledged and considered, 14 conversation style consultation sessions were held with 24 key stakeholders from the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander sector. These consultation sessions were held online during July and August 2021 and facilitated by Karen Milward. The consultation sessions enabled Council to hear directly about the aspirations for reconciliation locally in Boroondara and opportunities for action and collaboration with the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander sector and peoples. The rich information gathered through these sessions formed the foundation for the development of the vision, themes, strategic objectives and focus areas for action in the draft Strategy.

As the reconciliation process involves the non-Aboriginal community working together with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, Council also undertook pulse check surveys with the broader community and local community service providers and organisations to understand their views and ideas about how to be involved and progress reconciliation locally.

The online community pulse check survey, which was undertaken between 8 July and 1 August 2021, was open to all community members and was widely promoted through Council's communication channels. In total, 480 respondents completed the survey, which provided Council with a pulse check of the sentiment towards reconciliation and captured ideas for how Council might progress it locally, as well as respondents' level of knowledge of the histories and cultures of Aboriginal and Torres Strait peoples in Australia and Boroondara.

A targeted online survey was also undertaken and completed by 26 local organisations between July and August 2021. The organisations represented a cross-section of community groups and service providers in Boroondara including arts groups, religious groups, educational institutions, neighbourhood houses, health and wellbeing services and community groups. The purpose of the survey was to gather information about existing activities already taking place locally to support reconciliation and to gauge respondents' level of interest in engaging with Council and other organisations to progress reconciliation together.

To ensure the development of the Strategy was informed by feedback and advice from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, Council also met regularly with representatives from the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation and other key stakeholders to seek advice on the development.

The information gathered through the consultations with key stakeholders from the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander sector, the broader community and community organisations and service providers, as well as the background research was used to inform the development of the Strategy's vision, themes, strategic objectives, focus areas for action and the implementation plan. The three key themes along with the strategic objectives are outlined below:

• Theme 1: Understand, Acknowledge and Respect

Strategic Objective 1: Build awareness and understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, cultures and peoples so we can contribute towards the reconciliation process and acknowledge and celebrate the resilience, strengths and contributions Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples make to the community.

• Theme 2: Relationships and Partnerships

Strategic Objective 2: Create and strengthen reciprocal relationships between Traditional Owners and other Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations and peoples, Council, and the broader community so we can progress reconciliation initiatives together.

• Theme 3: Governance and Leadership

Strategic Objective 3: Provide a whole of Council response to reconciliation and enable the voice of Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander peoples to inform Council decision making to support equitable and inclusive opportunities and participation in the community.

The implementation plan which will operationalise the draft Strategy outlines 46 actions, which will be undertaken over the four years of the Strategy. The implementation plan captures actions Council was already undertaking to progress reconciliation to ensure they continue to be prioritised and builds on these to include new actions Council will undertake in response to the findings from the consultation and research. The action plan will be reviewed and updated annually.

Council is committed to collaborating with the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation and other key Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander stakeholders, community groups and organisations and the broader community to implement, monitor and evaluate the actions in the draft Boroondara Reconciliation Strategy.

To ensure the Strategy remains relevant and achievable, regular progress updates on the implementation of actions and feedback will be sought at Council's scheduled meetings with the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation. Advice will also be sought from other key stakeholders in the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander sectors as required. Furthermore, members of Council's newly established Internal Boroondara Reconciliation Advisory Committee will provide advice and feedback on the implementation of the draft Boroondara Reconciliation Strategy 2022-26 at its regular meetings.

3.2 Adjoining 9 & 11 Weybridge Street, Surrey Hills - Proposed sale of land from a previously discontinued right of way

This report is to consider commencement of the statutory procedures to sell the land from the previously discontinued road adjoining 9 and 11 Weybridge Street, Surrey Hills. The land is currently unoccupied and unused and is considered by officers to be suitable for sale to the adjoining property owners.

In 1999 Council resolved to discontinue and sell the 3.66m wide road at the rear of 21 to 31 Scheele Street and 24 to 32 Langford Street and adjoining 9 and 11 Weybridge Street, Surrey Hills, shown hatched on **Attachment 1**. While the majority of the land from the former road has been sold, the section between 9 and 11 Weybridge Street, shown hatched in **Attachment 2**, has not yet been sold. Council took title to the land in 2008.

Recent consultation undertaken with both of the adjoining owners has resulted in both of the owners expressing an interest in acquiring the land. However, while the owner of 9 Weybridge Street favours a longitudinal division of the land, the owner of 11 Weybridge Street favours a latitudinal division of the land.

Council's Strategic and Statutory Planning Department was consulted in regard to its requirements/preference to the division of land having regard to the presence of Council's drainage assets located in the land.

As part of the consultation, the Strategic and Statutory Planning department initially advised preference for a latitudinal division, as shown in the draft Plan of Subdivision PS848222C (version 1), in **Attachment 4.** This would provide greater access to the Council drain and Council pit in the land and reduce the amount of fence that is immediately adjacent to the existing Council drain reducing the chance of damage to the drain from the fence placement.

Further investigation was undertaken by the department resulting in advice supporting the option of a longitudinal division of the land. Council officers identified there is minimal risk to Council's drainage assets as the drain is located closer to the western boundary of the land than first thought. There will be sufficient clearance from the edge of the drainage pipe and edge of drainage pit to the centreline of the land. A longitudinal division would also be more conducive to the proper planning and development of the area and the land would be split in a fair and equitable manner to both adjoining properties as both will have an equal share of frontage and depth.

Commencement of the statutory procedures will provide owners, and any other interested parties, an opportunity to express their views on the proposal to Council prior to it making a decision on the proposed sale of the land, including its division/allocation.

- 1. Commence the statutory procedures to sell the land from the previously discontinued road adjoining 9 and 11 Weybridge Street, Surrey Hills, shown hatched in Attachment 2, and as annexed to the minutes, to the adjoining property owners by private treaty in accordance with Council policy.
- 2. Give notice of its intention to sell the land on Council's internet site, and in such notice state that Council proposes to sell the land to the abutting owners by private treaty, on a longitudinal basis, as shown in draft Plan of Subdivision PS848222C in Attachment 3, and as annexed to the minutes.
- 3. As part of its community engagement process, invite both written and verbal submissions on the proposed sale and deal with any submissions received in accordance with the principles set out in section 223 of the *Local Government Act 1989*.
- 4. If any submissions are received following the publication of the notice of intention to sell the land, note that a further report will be presented to Council to enable consideration of the submissions by Council and for a decision on the proposal.
- 5. If no submissions are received following the publication of the notice of intention to sell the land, authorise the Chief Executive Officer, or such other person as the Chief Executive Officer approves, to undertake the necessary procedural steps to complete the formal procedures for the sale of the land.
- 6. Authorise the Chief Executive Officer, or such other person as the Chief Executive Officer approves, to sign all necessary documentation for the sale of the land to the adjoining property owners in accordance with the purchase price detailed in section 6 of this report.

3.3 Updated Climate Action Plan Implementation Plan

This report presents a revised Climate Action Plan Implementation Plan, (refer **Attachment 1)**, for adoption by Council. The initial version of the Implementation Plan was adopted, along with the Climate Action Plan, by Council on 27 September 2021. The Implementation Plan incudes actions funded from a variety of Council project and operating budgets including a specific allocation of \$400,000 for the Climate Action Plan. As part of the October Amended Budget adopted by Council on 25 October 2021, Council increased the 2021/22 budget allocation for the Climate Action Plan to a total of \$1,000,000.

The budget allocation increase is reflected in the revised Implementation Plan in two ways.

- Through increased funding to existing actions, which either results in increased outputs for the action or the bringing forward of the action to the 2021/22 financial year.
- Through the development of additional actions, to be delivered in either 2021/22 or 2022/23.

The Implementation Plan provides details of the actions that will be taken across the next two financial years to make progress towards the Climate Action Plan targets for both Council operations and for the whole of Boroondara to reduce emissions and for other sustainability priorities.

3.4 Union Road LXRP: Planning project boundary amendment -Endorsement of Council submission

The Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP) launched a community consultation on 11 October 2021 to seek feedback on a proposal to amend the Union Road and Mont Albert Road level crossing removal planning project boundary. The consultation closed on Sunday 7 November 2021.

The proposed planning project boundary amendment includes three properties in Boroondara:

- Two residential properties:
 - 12 and 14 Montrose Street, Surrey Hills.
- A commercial property at 605 Canterbury Road, Surrey Hills.

The residential properties will be incorporated into the main entrance to the Surrey Hills Station now based on the north of the railway line. The commercial property will be used to house site workers.

Council officers prepared a submission (**Attachment 1**) to the Minister for Planning and LXRP about the planning project boundary offering no objection to the proposed changes and presented it to the LXRP by the due date of 7 November 2021.

The submission noted the need for the LXRP to minimise impacts to the community as a result of the inclusion of the three properties.

It also noted the submission had not been endorsed by Council, being subject of the 15 November 2021 Council meeting and correspondence would follow the Council meeting.

There were no speakers wishing to make submissions to Council for this item.





Climate Action Plan

Implementation Plan 2021/22 and 2022/23



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Introduction

The *Climate Action Plan (2021)* sets the direction for Council's response to the challenge of climate change over a ten-year period. This Implementation Plan defines the highest priority actions for implementation over the first two years. This Implementation Plan does not duplicate background information found in the Climate Action Plan, but presents tangible actions that will be undertaken by Council either alone or in partnership with our community or other organisations over the next two years.

Actions are grouped in tables according to the key themes of the Climate Action Plan. It is acknowledged that actions may support multiple themes and targets identified in the Climate Action Plan, however to avoid duplication actions have been nominally placed against themes they appear to be most aligned with. In some cases, where an action has strong links to multiple themes, the action has been included in the Overarching actions section.

There is also a complementary activities section which highlights some of Council's many complementary activities that are consistent with the Climate Action Plan's vision and objectives.

6 CAP Implementation Plan 2021/22 and 2022/23
