

A shared 'Place Vision' is on the way for Camberwell Junction.



Placemaking in Camberwell Junction

Your Camberwell Junction is set to transform. In September and October. our community shared their views and aspirations - telling us what they love most about Camberwell Junction and their big ideas for its future.

A number of community members expressed their desire for a town square-style space for people to gather and spend time together, enhanced greenery with more trees and open space, improved amenity, better safety and accessibility for pedestrians and cyclists, as well as a vibrant mix of shops and recreational opportunities.

Thank you to everyone who contributed their thoughts via the online engagement platform, Engage Boroondara. Your insights are now being collated to create a shared 'Place Vision' - the first step towards the development of a comprehensive 'Place Plan' for Camberwell Junction.

You'll be invited to participate further between March and May 2022 to help prioritise the ideas we've heard and to let us know whether the Place Vision has been captured correctly.

Council is taking a strategic approach to coordinate various initiatives being considered in the precinct.

One initiative is feasibility work on commuter car parking and improvement works to the existing multi-level Junction West car park off Harold Street. Camberwell. Council will consider the feasibility analysis for car parks, funded by the Federal Government Urban Congestion Fund, before a decision to consult more broadly.

Summer extension for parklets

With summer upon us and COVID-19 restrictions eased, outdoor trading is here to stay.

Council has extended the outdoor trading program implemented last year to help traders get back to business by fast-tracking permits and waiving all associated fees. This allowed businesses to accommodate more customers in a COVID-safe way on footpaths, public spaces and private land (including courtvards and car parks). Parklets were also installed across Boroondara's shopping strips.

The response has been overwhelmingly positive, particularly regarding the parklets opposite the Rivoli Cinema on Camberwell Road. They have transformed the strip into a bustling outdoor dining destination, with decorative lighting and music adding to a vibrant hub of activity.

Many additional footpath trading permits have now been issued free of charge until the end of March, and we've extended a number of parklets - including those on Camberwell Road.

What not to put in your FOGO bin

Please don't put banned items in your FOGO bin. They could put the whole truckload at risk of going to landfill. These are five of the most common 'contamination' mistakes residents make:

Mistake #1 Using a plastic bag to collect food waste

Only use lime-green liners that are made from 100 per cent cornstarch and certified compostable (with AS4736 and AS5810 symbols). Visit our FOGO bin webpage for more detail.

Mistake #2 Binning food in plastic containers, jars and cans

You must remove all food from wrappings, jars, bottles or cans before placing it in your FOGO bin. Put clean containers in your recycling bin, and take soft plastics to REDcycle at Coles or Woolworths, or put in your waste bin.

Mistake #3 Binning nappies

Nappies should go in your waste bin.

Mistake #4 Binning fruit stickers

Please remove stickers from fruit and peels before they go in your FOGO bin.

Mistake #5 Binning pet poo and litter

Compost pet poo at home using a pet poo composter (Council offers these for a subsidised price) or put in your waste bin only.

Spread the word and help us keep our FOGO material contamination free.
