Public art, such as murals, plays an important role in our urban environment well beyond aesthetics. They make a positive contribution to our community wellbeing. Artists, through paint and brush, can reflect and reveal our community values, create a strong sense of place and identity, add vibrancy to activate our public spaces, connect us with our past, and inspire us through creativity. A great example of the ability of art to create and inspire is the wheat silos project in country Victoria, where artists have created iconic masterpieces that are beautiful expressions of the human imagination.

Boroondara is renowned for its beautiful parks and green spaces. Council is also beautifying our urban spaces through public art in laneways, shopping precincts and other built forms. Balwyn and Balwyn North now have two public murals, located in the Balwyn shopping precinct in Yerrin Street, and in Gordon

Barnard Reserve. The Yerrin Street mural (pictured above) was painted by Blender Creatives and draws inspiration from Balwyn's living treasure, the nearby Maranoa Botanic Gardens which are Australia's oldest native botanic gardens.

The newest mural is next to the new fenced dog-play area in Gordon Barnard Reserve, which opened on 5 November. Painted by internationally acclaimed artist and place maker James Price, it pays tribute to Boroondara's most popular dog breeds, and uses a bright and joyful colour palette to reflect the happiness our family pets bring us.

There are other wonderful murals in Boroondara and I encourage you to enjoy their contribution to our city.

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New Hilda Street Reserve playground on its way

Local families can look forward to a new playground at Hilda Street Reserve, with construction due to begin early next year.

The playground design has been developed based on the ideas and feedback we received from the community in April.

Equipment includes a new combination unit with a rope bridge, inclined catwalk and a fire pole, and there will be monkey bars, a bucket spinner and junior and senior swings. Balancing logs, rocks for hopping and timber stumps will encourage nature-based play.

New pavement between the main path, picnic settings and some of the playground equipment will also be provided to improve accessibility.
