

A message from your Councillor

Gardiners Creek, also known as Kooyongkoot, is a much-loved waterway, ecological and transport corridor along our southern boundary. Council's Gardiners Creek Advisory Committee, on which I serve, has been overseeing the preparation of a draft master plan to thoughtfully guide revegetation and biodiversity works, water-sensitive urban design, and shared path upgrades. I'm expecting the draft master plan will be out for public consultation soon and that Council will be able to finalise it by the end of this year.

Large numbers of plastic bags and bottles and other debris were recovered from Gardiners Creek on Clean Up Australia Day. A special thank you to Graham Ross and the 1st Glen Iris Scouts for organising the event and to each and every one of the 55 volunteers who participated, including representatives from the KooyongKoot Alliance, Doctors for the Environment, Australian Conservation Foundation, Back 2 Nettleton Friends Group and the Mullumbimba Rovers.

The Glen Iris Heritage Study is expected to come to Council mid-year for final approval. It seeks heritage protection for a number of individually significant properties and a number of new precincts. All affected and adjoining property owners, residents and

submitters will be notified before the meeting. As I write this, the Ashburton Heritage Study is scheduled to go to Council in late-March and then to the Minister for Planning for final approval, although the previously proposed heritage protection for the High Street, Ashburton commercial precinct will be the subject of a separate review.

Finally, here are some of the things you, my fellow neighbours, have been telling me, and which I want to share and encourage:

- Cyclists please ride slowly and respectfully on our shared paths and remember that pedestrians have priority. Ross, Glen Iris and Graeme, Hawthorn East

Updates for local pavilions

Lewin Reserve pavilion

New power-line trial to aid canopy

If you've strolled through the beautiful streets of Gardiner Ward recently, you may have noticed the power lines in Fuller Avenue. Glen Iris look a little different than those in other areas.

Last year, Council upgraded the power lines along this avenue. This involved replacing the separated low-voltage wires with aerial bundled cable (ABC). ABC is a twisted black power line you might see in areas including Fuller Avenue and Bridges Street, Glen Iris.

Council carried out this project to determine how much it would cost, and whether it meant we could retain more street-tree canopy around power lines. Council clears branches from power lines to keep the community safe. The amount of pruning around electrical lines is directed by Victoria's energy regulatory body, Energy Safe Victoria, with requirements mandated by the Electricity Safety (Electric Line Clearance) Regulations 2020.

The ABC project was successful as it reduced the amount of pruning required in Fuller Avenue compared with trees near separated wires. However, the project cost \$120,000. In this case we were fortunate to share the costs. equally with United Energy, the power distributor in the area, due to some of the infrastructure needing renewal.

Due to this significant expense, ABC proved to be an option we can consider only in some circumstances. Fuller Avenue was chosen as a trial location due to its high number of large trees in good condition that had canopy close to the power lines.

We are also developing an alternative compliance option, which will involve us managing the risk from large branches near power lines by inspecting them more often. This will cost significantly less than ABC and will still allow us to retain more tree canopy near power lines. Council also continues to advocate for the Electric Line Clearance regulations to change to allow us to retain more street-tree canopy.

Wider path for Ferndale Trail

We are reconstructing a section of the popular Ferndale Trail, with upgrade works expected to be finished by June.

The Ferndale Trail provides a 2.2 km off-road, recreational shared path between the Anniversary Trail and the Gardiners Creek Trail in Glen Iris. While most of the path is unsealed and 3 metres wide, the section of the trail between Summerhill Road and Ferndale Road is sealed but very narrow at 1.5 metres wide.

The upgrade works will involve widening this section of the path to Council's standard 3-metre width, consistent with the width of the other sections of the trail and other off-road shared paths in Boroondara. The new path will be sealed and the drainage in the area will also be improved as part of the works.

Once complete, the widened path will improve access and safety for users and address community concerns about drainage and erosion at the path edges.
