New speed limit for Greythorn shopping centre

For several years, Council has advocated for the Department of Transport and Planning to reduce the speed limit on Doncaster Road through the Greythorn Central shopping centre in Balwyn North. We're pleased to see the success of our advocacy efforts, with a new 40 km/h speed limit now in place on Doncaster Road between Ferdinand Avenue and Ellsa Street from 8 am to 8 pm every day.

The new speed limit will improve safety for pedestrians and cyclists at the busy shopping strip. It will also help improve safety for drivers entering or exiting the angled car-parking bays and side roads.

North Balwyn RSL ceremonial closure

On 2 May, the North Balwyn RSL sub-branch held a formal closing ceremony, marking the end of its decades-long involvement in the community.

City of Boroondara Councillors and Council officers joined RSL Victoria representatives, RSL members and their families at the event, held at Greythorn Community Hub in North Balwyn.

The original building housing the North Balwyn RSL in Centre Way, North Balwyn, opened in 1959 and closed in June 2015. The RSL moved into its new home along with other community services and programs in the Greythorn Community Hub, which opened in September 2018. Part of the site has a restrictive covenant, which states that should the North Balwyn RSL close, the land must only be used for community services or for purposes benefitting the community; the Hub does exactly this, and Council is proud to be providing vital services in Boroondara for all ages at the Greythorn Community Hub.

The North Balwyn RSL sub-branch will live on at Greythorn Community Hub, through artefacts and memorabilia displayed throughout the building. Today the Greythorn Community Hub provides a vibrant and welcoming facility for residents too, building on a legacy more than 7 decades in the making.

Tutoring role helps ‘pay it forward’

Did you know Boroondara has the highest rate of volunteering in metro Melbourne? If you’re looking for a new activity this winter and a way to support your community, you could consider volunteering.

Maranoa resident Gay Ng has volunteered with the Melbourne Adult Migrant English Program (AMEP) Volunteer Tutor Scheme for almost 3 years, providing weekly one-on-one English tutoring.

Gay migrated to Australia as a child with her family. She recalls what a big shift it was, even though she and her family all spoke English. They found Australians generous and welcoming, which helped them settle into their new country. As a result of her positive experience, Gay decided she would like to pay it forward.

Gay had known about the Volunteer Tutor Scheme for a while. She had some spare time in 2020 and decided it was time to learn more about the program. She took the first step and found the online training straightforward and enjoyable. The

AMEP team then paired Gay with her ‘English practice buddy’, who had recently arrived in Australia, to start their tutoring sessions.

Gay says it has been a lot of fun getting to know the person she tutors and establishing a friendship over time. She notes the program is flexible and not too demanding – she spends an hour each week with her buddy, via video chat or sometimes over a coffee.

Gay says there is such a range of options for prospective volunteers that there’s bound to be something to suit everyone. She suggests thinking of something you care about or enjoy and looking for volunteering options in that area.

Planting trees to reduce our emissions

We planted around 2,000 new trees in Boroondara in the 2022-23 financial year. This included the 1,000 trees we commit to planting every year, as well as an additional 1,000 trees we promised to plant in the last financial year as an action of our Climate Action Plan.

Here in Maranoa Ward and surrounds, this included:

- around 130 new trees in Balwyn
- around 270 new trees in Balwyn North
- around 90 new trees in Surrey Hills and Mont Albert.

Young trees, whether planted on your nature strip by Council, or in your own backyard, will always benefit from a little extra attention.

Water it: We water new trees in public spaces to help them get established in their new home. To check whether your

new trees need watering, feel the soil just below the layer of mulch – if the soil is dry, the tree should be watered.

Mind the bark: When mowing and using line trimmers, avoid contact with a tree's bark. Bark helps protect trees from pests and diseases, and damaging it can cause serious harm, especially to young trees.

Give it space: Avoid parking cars too close to a tree or storing heavy machinery or materials beneath the canopy to ensure the soil doesn't compact and oxygen can reach the roots. For young trees, try to leave 2 metres of clear space around them.

Report it: Help us care for our street trees by letting us know if there are issues with a tree's health and reporting any acts of vandalism via our easy online form at: service.boroondara.vic.gov.au/report-an-issue
